I designed, and was programme director for the MSc in Counselling Psychology at the University of Sussex on which I lectured and gave clinical and research supervision. I was also an internal examiner. The course was integrative (combining CBT, brief psychodynamic and systemic therapies) and had a strong research base. It was specifically designed to equip counsellors and psychotherapists with the skills and attitudes needed to work in the NHS. I worked 0.6 FTE at the Psychological and Counselling Services Unit at the University of Sussex. I saw up to five clients, supervised six counsellors and undertook three assessments a week. Clients tended to be university students and staff and the work was mainly short term.

I use and have training in, a variety of assessment tools including NEO PI-R UK Edition and MBTi for personality, the WAIS iv for ability, IESr and the IAPT data collection measures for symptoms. I also use CORE as an outcome measure and occasionally use Repertory Grids.

### **Research Interests**

My specialism is in the evaluation of psychological interventions in primary care. (See publications below). I have recently been engaged in a pilot study on the development of new ways of delivering IAPT services in South Gloucestershire as part of the CPTPC unit at the University of Chester. I have also collaborated with the Institute of Psychiatry in a meta-analysis of psychological interventions in primary care using data from a controlled trial I carried out at University of Sussex. I have a particular interest in the development of programmes for working with patients who somatise. The programme that I developed is taught to primary care counsellors in the Midlands and has been evaluated by Professor Peter Spurgeon from the University of Birmingham with a focus on medical cost offset (Spurgeon et al 2005). As a research fellow for 12 years I ran a research team and consistently gained funding from research funding bodies. I have recently been part of a study on evaluating assessments in IAPT organisations.
