PROFILE

Malcolm Jenkins is an experienced fire investigator, instructor and assessor who has conducted many hundreds of fire investigations, both during his fire service career and in the private sector. He has investigated a wide variety of incidents, including accidental fires, non-terrorist explosions and fatal fires in domestic, commercial and industrial premises.

Malcolm has experience in preparing and presenting evidence for use in the criminal justice system at all levels. He has been a manager of a fire investigation team and an arson task force manager. He is a qualified Fire Safety inspecting officer and has an in-depth knowledge of the fire service and fire service procedures. Malcolm also has experience in identifying areas of training need and developing training programmes to meet those needs, as well as to further develop and improve individual and organisational performance.

Malcolm has produced many reports for use as evidence in criminal proceedings both for prosecution and defence purposes. He has presented evidence as an expert witness at Magistrates and Crown Courts and also Coroners inquests. He has provided training, both practical and classroom based relating to Fire and Arson Investigation to Fire Officers, Police, PCSO's and CSI's. He has also spoken at local and national conferences on the subject of Fire Investigation and Arson reduction.

In May 2010, he retired from the fire service after 31 years of service. He formed a limited company specialising in fire investigation and fire safety, including case review and defence work. He also worked with Gardiner Fire Investigation as a forensic fire investigator for five years. In addition to this, he also provides forensic fire investigation instruction for Gardiner Associates Training and Research (GATR) and is an assessor for the Skills for Justice Awards level 5 certificate in Fire Investigation.

Accidental Fire Case (2017)

2-bedroom house used as a squat (BBQ in bedroom). Resulted in serious injuries to persons, one moderate and one serious.

Accidental Fire Case (2018)

2-bedroom end terrace house. A fault in an e-cigarette battery resulted in injury to one of the occupiers.

Accidental Fire Case (2018)

1-bedroom flat. The misuse of an appliance resulted in the death of the occupant.

Accidental Fire Case (2019)

Commercial property/electrical retail store. A faulty vacuum cleaner battery resulted in critical injuries to the owner.

Accidental Fire Case (2019)

Fire in a student bedsit caused by a cigarette in an armchair.

Accidental fire case (2020) Careless disposal of a cigarette resulting in serious injuries to the occupier

Deliberate fire case (2021). Deliberate ignition of bedding resulting in serious injuries.

Accidental Fire in Hostel (2022). Smoking related fire.

Accidental workshop fire (2023) Linseed oil in rags in wastebin

In addition to the formal qualifications gained during this period (listed above). I consider preparing scenes for, and acting as an instructor on each practical Fire Investigation course (3-4 weeks a year) a form of highly effective CPD. This includes developing scenes, supervising exercises, passing information, reinforcing the knowledge gained by students and assessing the need for further instruction.

I also receive communication and information from the Institution of Fire Engineers, The Chartered Society for Forensic Sciences, the International Association of Arson Investigators and the UK Association of Fire Investigators and Skills for Justice Awards circulars. These publications keep me aware of new developments in the field of Fire Investigation. I also take part in webinars to maintain and improve my subject matter awareness. I also receive updates from the HM Courts and Tribunal Service on a regular basis.

Furthermore, as part of each case I handle, I conduct research into whatever specific subject is at issue, this can take the form of online research, reading published material or discussion with colleagues.

On the assessing front. Each assessment is a learning process. I take part in standardisation meetings both in person and online. As a team, we have regular discussion sessions sometimes based on blind second marking of material; these have shown a very good level of consistency between different assessors. I believe feedback from candidates is consistently positive regarding the assessment process for both level 2 and level 5 qualifications.
