He has a long history of assessing individuals detained under the Police and Criminal Evidence Act 1984. His contributions to the field are well-documented, with extensive publications in peer-reviewed literature and co-editing the first book for healthcare professionals on this subject.

His legal acumen is well established, and he has 12 years of experience writing court reports and providing evidence across magistrates, crown, and coroner courts. In 2022, he was seconded to NHS England as part of Dame Ruth May's Chief Nursing Officer's Clinical Nurse Fellowship programme.

He is often required to prepare statements for the courts or give evidence, including at magistrates, crown, and coroner's courts.
